Embrace cultural values - Unam director

THE director of the University of Namibia Southern campus, Erold Naomab, has urged students to embrace their cultural heritage. He made these remarks during the institution's annual cultural festival held at Keetmanshoop last week.

Naomab said such platforms are essential conduits and instruments that remind people to remain vigilant in protecting their shared core values.

"This event should provoke a deep sense of anxiety and common strong zeal and desire to protect our cultural identities," he stated.

He said social evils such as alcohol and drug abuse and gender-based violence were nowadays holding communities hostage, adding that these are not cultural norms and values, and shall never have a standard position of equivalence to people's identity. "The proliferation of so-called drug hubs in our villages and towns must be rooted out," he stressed.

Naomab then urged the youth to make use of various instruments of positive change offered by the campus through its //Karas

innovation hub, while calling on student leaders to openly campaign against drug and alcohol abuse and gender-based violence. The hub's key objectives are to stimulate and advance an entrepreneurial culture, create an enabling environment for start-ups, and accelerate enterprise development in new and exciting value chains, which can create jobs for Namibians, especially women and youth.

Seaflower Group companies' general manager Inocencia Verde, a former vice chairperson of the Unam Council, said in his keynote address that there is a need to embrace cultural diversity because through it, people gather strength.

"We need to be united in the fights we have. Let

us practise and live unity across the board," he urged.

He also commended the festival's theme of 'enhancing diversity and cultural awareness,' saying people in various regions are no longer embracing diversity. "Some people feel that if you are not from this region, then you are not welcome in the structures that be, while others get intimidated with diversity," he stated, adding that some people

want to impose their cultures onto others. He reminded students that each of them is a leader, and thus should take charge to make a positive impact in society. "Take charge and control of your life; do not just maintain it. This means you must take the risk. Let us not surrender leadership to faces, lies and fences. Leadership plays an important role in our economy," he added.
