"Fyf" Rand was identified as one of such communities", says Dr Ian Baines, a Vet with over 30 years experience. "I left my practices 3 years ago to start teaching. It is more rewarding", he adds. The Clinic travels once per month, and travels the whole country, servicing each region at least twice a year. Services include, sterilization, dental work, treatment for ticks and general advice.

"This is my first time", she said. "I heard people talking, that there will be a clinic here today and decided not to sell my Oshikundu this morning".


